- \$1 million anonymous bequest to benefit Brightside for Families and Children, a Mercy Medical Center affiliate, as well as a \$175,000 realized bequest from the estate of Florence Cardosi.

The new pavilion, almost 12,000 square feet of space, will be dedicated to the complex needs of our aging population. The floor will offer inpatient and outpatient services and include 15 patient rooms, therapy rooms, dining and social facilities and several specialty suites.

For more than 40 years, John J. O'Brien, M.D. worked at Saint Francis Hospital as an orthopedic surgeon and knew first-hand the dedication and talent of his fellow colleagues. However, it wasn't until his wife of almost 52 years, Pat, developed stage four stomach cancer that he experienced their passion and commitment. Led by Jonathan Sporn, M.D, Pat's oncology team from the Cancer Center included — Brittany, Carla, Stephanie, Sybil, Patty and APRNs Aggie and Andrea — and the 8-1 inpatient floor — Heidi, Bella, Dave, Gilda — and so many more. It was there that Dr. O'Brien and his family realized these nurses were angels and the true backbone of the hospital. The care Pat received was tender, compassionate, skilled and everything the family needed to see them through a very difficult time.

There was an outpouring of gifts donated to the hospital in Pat's memory, and Dr. O'Brien wanted to make sure those gifts went to the oncology nurses. He established the Patricia Ann O'Brien Oncology Nursing Education Endowment Fund with a \$100,000 investment. The fund will, in perpetuity, sustain and enhance formal and informal, lifelong professional development learning initiatives for nursing and support staff to meet the complexities of caring for cancer patients. The fund also accepts gifts from other donors. Johnson Memorial Hospital Auxiliary

“On Tuesday, April 22, 1913, a committee of 18 ladies representing the nine churches of Stafford, met at the Johnson Hospital... and formed an organization intended to be the nucleus of a larger society...”

These words opened the very first annual report of the Ladies Aid Society, now the Johnson Memorial Hospital Auxiliary, more than 100 years ago. Their fundraiser, a food sale which took all summer to plan and prepare, raised a “very generous” \$18.75 by selling over 250 donated jars and cans of food. Since its inception, the Auxiliary has supported the hospital through fundraising events, gift shop operations, scholarships for volunteers and students pursuing careers in the health care field, and other special projects.

COVID-19 GRANTS

During the uncertain times of COVID-19, our hospitals have been challenged in ways never seen before and have incurred many ongoing, unexpected expenses due to COVID-19. Stanley Black & Decker Provides the Gift of Life with Donation of \$50,000

Stanley Black & Decker generously donated \$50,000 to Saint Francis Hospital to support the COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma Clinical Trial. Greg Polk, Vice President of Global Citizenship at Stanley Black & Decker, stated, "We are honored to partner with Saint Francis Hospital and Trinity Health Of New England on this life-saving COVID-19 Plasma Study. At this time of uncertainty, we are especially grateful to support our frontline workers who are diligently helping to ease the pain of those suffering from the coronavirus."

In April, Trinity Health Of New England was one of only four health care organizations in the country to receive approval from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to conduct a clinical trial on the use of convalescent plasma to treat severe cases of COVID-19.

To date, convalescent plasma has been administered to over 40 Trinity Health Of New England patients who were critically ill from COVID-19. The clinical trial is being conducted at Saint Francis Hospital, Saint Mary's Hospital, Johnson Memorial Hospital, and Mercy Medical Center. Patients in the trial may experience shorter hospital stays, shorter use of ventilators and shorter duration of viral symptoms.

So far, over \$66,000 has been donated to the Breast Care Center patient assistance fund. Their goal is to help patients with financial needs ease the pain and burden they will face daily while going through treatment. They wanted to make a difference and make a patient’s new normal a little more manageable.

Saint Mary’s Hospital – \$75,000 – Pink Out

The Saint Mary’s Hospital Foundation GOES PINK in October! Waterbury’s citywide *Pink Out* celebration raises awareness and funds for the Saint Mary’s Breast Screening Fund, which serves an average of 150 local women every year. During the month of October, the City dresses in *Pink* in support of the campaign. This year, the shirts were designed by a Saint Mary’s colleague and sold by the Saint Mary’s Hospital Foundation. Over the past two years, the citywide *Pink Out* event has raised over \$75,000.

The Breast Screening Fund is available to women in the Greater Waterbury community who otherwise may not have access to these procedures and are available through physicians or clinical referrals. In 1897, Mother Ann Valencia and her small group of Sisters of Saint Joseph of Chambery arrived in Hartford with a mission — to establish a hospital to honor Saint Francis de Sales, a gentle and compassionate saint. In 1997, The Valencia Society was founded by former Governor and Mrs. William O’Neill and is now nearly 600 members strong. This unique philanthropic society is grateful to every member who has carefully thought about how they can help Saint Francis and Mount Sinai continue to serve our patients well into the future. Joscelyn McNaughton, a former nurse at Saint Francis, had a tremendous fondness for the hospital and told us about her arrangements to leave her estate to the hospital. We lost Joscelyn this past year and received more than \$100,000 to support the Dr. Robert M. Jeresaty Cardiovascular Symposium.



Slocum Society – Saint Mary’s Hospital

In 1906, the Right Reverend Monsignor William J. Slocum recognized the need for a Catholic Hospital in the heart of Waterbury’s industrial core that was open to all races and creeds. With his own personal gift of \$20,000, Monsignor Slocum purchased the property on Union and Franklin Streets that would become the home of our beloved Saint Mary’s Hospital.
